

Apprentices during the Time of their Apprenticeship are under the Power of their Masters, to whom any Gain they make both accrue, unless it be otherwise agreed; and may be corrected moderately by them, for Faults and Misdemeanours. In a Process of the Instinct of a Master against the Cautioner in the Indenture for his Apprentice, for making up to the Master Suer Damages sustained by the Apprentice imbezeling his Goods, and dispossessing of them without his Knowledge, a Tract of comedick Fleering to the Apprentice being proven: the Lords allowed the Master to give his Oath in Item upon the particular Species, Quantities and Prices of the Goods imbezled, reserving to themselves to modify after his Deposition 7 Novemb. 1609 Forrester contra Nefton and Her it being imposed for a Master to prove all the Particulars otherwise. The Cautioner for an Apprentice is not free from causing the Apprentice serve out his Time, and from paying Damages for his Absence upon this Account that the Master having got the Prentice fee, suffered him to escape and go beyond Sea, without Intimation to the Cautioner, that he might restrain him or bring him back to his Service; as if the Master had been presumed to connive by Collusion with the Apprentice at his going abroad in Order to recover Damages off the Cautioner 17 June 1663 Allan contra Peterfor. A Master should not employ his Apprentice in any other Work than his Calling. And where the Master's Damage thro his Apprentice's Absence out of his Service, was liquidated by the Indenture to two Days Service for one Day's Absence; the Time ~~the~~ the Apprentice was implied by his Master in other Work than his Calling, was allowed to compensate so many of his absent Days 14 January 1673 Symontown contra Brocks. And where a Master's Damage thro his Apprentice's Absence was agreed to be two Days' Wages for each Day's Absence; the Lord modified the Penalty of three Years' Absence to 50 pound 17 June 1663 Allan contra Peterfor.

Where a Master dies within the Term of the Apprenticeship; his Representative ought to instruct the Apprentice, or bind him over to some other Master of the same Calling, for the Remainder of the Time, or must restore a Proportion of the Prentice fee. 16 Feb. 1711 Cutler contra Littleton. But one who entered into Indentures to a Chirurgeon Apothecary in Edinburgh, who was bound to book him in the Dean of Gild Bobbs of that City and to make him free-Man of his Calling theray was found not intitled to claim any Abatement of the Prentice fee upon the Master removing himself Kirkaldy to exercise his Employment there; where it could not be supposed the Apprentice would have that Insight and Improvement in his Calling as in the metropolitan City, where Apprentices have also

the Benefit of the Physick Garden. But the Apprentice was found intitled to follow his Master, the Master always instructing last by the Custom of the Calling all Apprentices to one who is a free-Man Chirurgeon in Edinburgh, so by their Service acquire Freedom in that Calling in Edinburgh, whatever Place their Master live in during their Apprenticeship. In Respect the Indenture laid no Obligation on the Master to reside within Edinburgh, and the Nature of the Contract implied no such thing: it being arbitrary to a Master of Craft, to seek his Trade where he can best have it, and be the fittest judge of his own Conveniency where to set up and practice. Nor is it to be supposed that he would go and settle at Kirkaldy had he not some Assurance of more Practice there where there is none to compete with him, than at Edinburgh where there are so many able Men of his Employment. But the Master was deemed to book his Apprentice in the Dean of Gild Bobbs of Edinburgh in due Time, that is 3 Years after the booking of his last.

concerning Precedency, and Communities or Corporations

Chap. I. of Precedency.

precedency or precedence is that Rank or place of Honour which is a person is intitled to in comparison either foritting or Walking. Precedency is either of Courtesy or of Right & Justice; The former is due to Age, to Estate &c. which is regulated by Custom and Civility; The latter is settled by Authority, and which is made in upon Gibbs an Action at Law. Tho' there were no dispute or difference arising from the Ambition and vanity of those that affect to set themselves above others; and that on the contrary obey made it his Bisness to give way to others, and to place ~~and~~ himself below those whose Rank is intitlable to him: yet it will be necessary to have Rules touching Rank and precedency, pointing out to every one what place belongs to him; for prohibiting the publick viceroy of Society and Country on every occasion where many persons meet together? Among those who are suproyng Kings are forsworne to common wealths, and the Emporer of Germany takes place of Kings, as successeur to the Roman Emperors, who are thought to have been universal Monarchs, because they are said in Scripture to have taxed the whole world Luke 2. 1. I shall not debate so much contrabated precedency of Kings, common wealths and patriarchs among one another, but refer my Reader who is curious to know that matter to the first Sebon Chapter of Sir T. More's Treatise of precedency, and content myself to handle briefly the precedency of Subjects in Scotland.

In the Question touching Rank and precedency, it is necessary to distinguish i) The precedency of the orders among them selfs, ii) corporations and Laymen. Both which have this in common, that there are in every one of them ~~different~~ kinds of persons, which distinguish the persons of each as it were into divers classes, which have different Ranks among them selves, & the order
