 Winner and his tutors or Curators, it sufficeth to Enter
 the Winner Name in the Book of Involment without men-
 tion of Tutor or Curators who are Razed only, Edictally
 Intersse, and not Concluded against Nominal Defendants

 of Involment for the Outer House, according to the date of
 Return from the Advocate who saw the process, & delat by
 72 Art. 20 Ordinary Actions are Entered in the first Book of
 Involment for the Inner House, according to the date of the
 judgments, or Tutor or tutors appearing at a hearing in
 and Concluded causes in the other Book according to the date
 of the last Razed, viz the causes, viz. Art. 7. Arithmetical
 figures of 1. 2. 3. 4. 8. c. are prefixed to causes as they are
 Entered in the Books of Involment for the Outer House. At
 first coming out of each weekly ordinary to the Outer
 House upon Tuesday Morning, the Keeper lays before
 the said Books with a Tacket subscribed Clap to the Col-
 laborer upon the Saturday immediately preceding in
 Clap words, the total number of causes entered upon
 every last such a day of the Month, Colours to such a Number
 which day of the Month, and Number of causes it to be
 Razed in Word and not in Arithmetical figures, It
 cost the pain of 30 pence ^{only} quoted in case of failure in
 Impression till payment thereof be made to the poor book

but of Each of the two Books for the Outer House, the
 keeper doth copy a Roll of so many causes in the order
 they were Entered as he thinks sufficient for the Judge
 words and prefixeth to that of ordinary Actions a Roll
 of causes wherein no Compesane was made for
 the Defendant at the first calling by the Clerk in the
 outer House, called the Regulation Roll, because

Appointed by the Act of Regulation 1695 (Art. 21). Which
 Rolls he affixeth each Monday Morning upon the Roll of
 the Outer House; and any of those which are not then Reached,
 or Disputed, by Act, decree, or protestation, must be Entered
 in the beginning of the subsequent weekly Roll of that date.
 Where process is delayed to a day till persons subscribed see
 the same or that some time may be produced, the day to which they
 are called is called by the ordinary Minutes on the Margin of the Roll
 these Roman so Marked in all subsequent Rolls till they be either
 on that day. Again one Roll not the former house has Roll out of that
 book of Ordinary Actions for that purpose, and has Roll out of that
 book of Concluded causes, viz one of for concluded causes to be prepared and
 finished of such causes prepared for Hearing. 41 which is
 the Report of the Council at 12 o'clock every Monday Morning
 offered if need be, on the wall of the Outer House. The Keeper of
 the Books of Involment doth also put up weekly a Roll of causes
 to be heard Summarily in presence, called the Roll of Causes
 and of causes wherein proof by oath or Roll is Marked clear
 the former of which Rolls is affixed to the wall of the Outer
 House upon Monday Morning, and the latter upon Friday after-
 noon Act of Regul. 1695 Art. 22 Act of 1709 20 Novemb. 1711 51
 But causes in the Defendants name Roll and the other Roll of
 clear proofs are not prepared in Books of Involment, but the
 Act of 1709 (20 Novemb. 1711) expressly orders a Book
 of Involment of Causes to be summarily heard in presence.

It had been some times formerly a practice to press
 a cause several times in order to get it brought in before
 an ordinary the Purser Deforce, in which case if such
 an ordinary was not in the Outer House at the Calling
 by the first or second Involment &c. he did let the cause
 scode out of the Assembly Roll, till he lay upon an
 ordinary to his Mind. Now obviating this, the Keeper
 of the Rolls is prohibited to involve any cause more than
 once, Or to Invol so many causes scode out of the Roll
 except in course as they are Given up, and appointed
 to March the first Involment. Upon the process for
