 all I cannot help thinking, for George Wilkerson (Brimpart
 2 Git. 27) is mistaken in asserting, that upon a verdict find-
 ing one guilty of forgery in the proof of a Deed of Inpro-
 priation of the Lord of Sessions, that justices are tied expresly
 to condemn him to be hanged. For there are several In-
 stances in the Books of adjournal, whereupon such a Ver-
 dict they adjudge the pannel only to an arbitrary punish-
 ment. Thus one who was both a Proponer and Notary
 was ordered to be hanged and Deprived of his office for
 counterfeiting Phages and Siminations of burning 28 March
 1608 William Strachan. A Notary for forging a Phage was
 ordered to be Deprived from his office, set on the Market
 Cross with a paper on his forehead signifying his Crimes,
 and banished 20 July 1638 William Murray the Another Not-
 ary for using false writs knowing them to be false, was
 adjudged to be infamous, to have his ear nailed to the throne
 with a paper on his breast declaring the Reason of being
 un lawfull there, and to be banished, ult. Feb. 1650 Thomas
 Lawrie. A Sheriff Clerk who forged a Discharge and perjured
 himself in his trial and Examination therein, was
 ordered to be infamous, Deprived and incapable of off-
 -fice, to stand on the Market Cross with a paper on his
 head signifying his offences, and to be banished to live
 all the days of his life, and his Movable to be
 Escheat to the King 2 Feb. 1636 Thomas M^r Kir. But
 was not sustained Relevant to Make the forger of a
 Receipt and the subscription of the Banker a crime
 in Scotland, subject to punishment conform to the
 law of Scotland 16 July 1716 Alexander Ramsay. In the
 proof by the Union (art. 68. 18) Scotland is under the same
 prohibitions, Restrictions and Limitations of Trade as
 England, and the law of England imposing a lesser
 punishment than what is inflicted by the law of Scot-
 land being made void ex post facto, that lesser pain
