Mr George M. Lewis hath published observations on the Acts of Parliament down to the Death of King Charles the second anno . . . But that is only an Embryo of what is wanting to be done on so vast a subject.

Mr John Nibbel of Berketon left behind him a treatise Intituled, Doubts and Questions in Law writ without any order. Which was brushed into some form and Method by Mr William Hamilton of Whitehall some time a Senator in the College of Justice and Lord of Justiceary. This book was published in the Year 1696 by Mr Robert Bennet Advocate. Answer to such of these Doubts and Questions as Dea Thynne wanted the Author from resolving, writ by Mr James Stewart of Goodtrees Advocate to King William the second Anno were published in the Year . . .

Mr John Skene of Burrihill Clerk Register wrote a very usefull book de Verborum significatio anno 1597. Which is an Alphabetical Explanation of the Law terms of Scotland, of the same Nature with Mr Henry Spelman's Glossary. The learned Author a good while after Publishing thereof was knighted for his Merit. It was first printed and subjoyned to his Edition of the Acts of Parliament; and thereafter Reprinted and Annexed to Mr Thomas Murray of Glendock his Edition of the Acts of Parliament in folio Anno 1681.

### Collections of Titles.

The Largest and best Collection of Titles, is that Systeme Computed by George Dallas of St. Martin's writer to the Signet published folio in the Year 1697.

There was printed Octavo in the Year 1709 by an Anonymous Author a Compend or Abbreviate of the Most Important ordinary Faculties of Rights personal and Real, Reasonable and Unreasonable.

John Spotswood Advocate published his Introduction

to the Knowledge of the Rule of writs Octavo in the Year . . . which was Reprinted with some additions anno 1710 Comprehending personal or temporary Rights and Conveyances which had been Dictated by James Hay of Paribber writer to the Signet to Mr Spaldwood when he wrote as apprentice in his Chamber.
