

Some Account of writing on the Scots Law.

Mr George McKenzie of Ruthmug in the county of Ross,<sup>was</sup> was the son of Simon McKenzie (Brother to the Earl of Seaforth) by Elizabeth Bruce his wife daughter to Dr Andrew Bruce Doctor of the University of St Andrews, was born at Dundee in the year 1636. After he had run thro' the stages of Logick and philosophy in Aberdeen and St Andrews when he was scarce 10 years of age he travelled into France, and in the university of Bourges applied his studies with great zeal to the civil law about three years time. After his return into his native country when scarce twenty years of age he became an Advocate. 9 June 1662 He was appointed <sup>upon the Dissolution of Parliament</sup> to the most Honourable Justice dispute conjunct with Mr Alexander Cattoe during all the days of his lifetime, and shortly after his death. He was in the year 1678 made the Kings Advocate ~~successor~~ <sup>successor</sup> to Sir George who post he kept till the beginning of the reign of King James 7. At which time seeing him of a zealous heart and zealous hand in taking away of his penal statutes he was in February 1687 turned out and for John Dalrymple younger of Stair was put in his place. He was restored again to his office of Lord Advocate 27 February 1688, and continued in it till the Revolution made by King William coming to the Throne in 1689. In September that year he retired to Oxford because a superior there for a time; a few quinesters of the Bodleian Library, and on the 2 June 1690 was by the Faculty of the Divinity congregation of Regents admitted a student there. He died in St James's street on May 1691.
