And thus the Justinian Law appearing to be a much better Law than the Laws of the barbarous nations did not only stand itself within the bounds of the Alps, but it soon past over those Hills and began by degrees to be introduced into the several universities of France and Germany...

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This Supreme Court was formerly held in the Imperial palace. But in the year 1495 the Imperial Chamber was solled at nooms: But by a subsequent Constitution this court is now solled at spires, unto which all the Electors pences and subjects of the Empire yield obedience as to a court of Honor.
